Unit 1 The Music in Roman Empire Roman music Odeio found in Greece	
Activity n°	1
Description of content	<i>The activity is about Roman culture and music. The activity will also focus on the Roman music Odeio that is settled in Nikopolis, Preveza Greece.</i>
Learning outcomes and competencies	<i>The learning outcome of the activity is to show that there is a strong link between ancient greek culture and roman culture and that both cultures are the roots of the modern european culture. The competencies acquired are: global education thinking skills (the world has always been intertwined), the music as a global language, economy knowledge, multicultural mindset that will help learners achieve 21 st century skills in the globalized world.</i>
Materials and equipment	Computer, blackboard/screen, videos from Youtube, pictures og ancient greek and Roman theatres , visites on the field will be used.
Setting	<i>Face to face with a teacher</i>
Theoretical lessons	<i>The music in Ancient Roman Empire</i>
Duration	<i>The activity will take place in 45 minutes.</i>

<p>Type of interaction and brief description of the activity</p>	<p><i>The activity will take place in the form of the whole class, group and individual work. Students will first be presented photos of different types of buildings, modern and ancient. Then the students will be asked to put those buildings in groups from the period that they were built and depending on their use.. Students will then be shown the pictures of the Roman music Odeio in Nikopolis. They will discuss about how people communicate, if all the cultures are connected, the method of critical thinking and discuss and compare globalization in Roman times and globalization in modern times. They will learn that Roman international distance trade brought a lot of revenues to the Roman Empire, not only wars and slavery as we usually think, but also people were affected in personal level (culture, language, habits) that changed their lifes.</i></p> <p><i>The teacher will study the topic of the object via the catalogue of Roman era objects in the National Museum of Athens,the Ancient Olympia museum and via Youtube videos dealing with Roman trade with distant lands and videos about Ancient music.</i></p> <p><i>(Videos will be used so students will be prepared to brainstorm what they already know about the life in the Roman Empire and will learn new vocabulary- such as Odeio, Ancient Theatre, Greek-Roman Culture, etc.</i></p> <p><i>The video shown will be no longer than 5 minutes and will be followed by the task/quiz taken from the Greek University of Epirus. In order to deepen the understanding of the topic , post-lesson excursion to the Ancient Roman Odeio in Nikopolis will be organized to see in person the magnifisent ancient building and compare it with the Ancient Greek Theatres.</i></p> <p>.</p>
<p>Glossary</p>	<p><i>Greek- Roman civilization, Roman music Odeio, Ancient Greek Theatre.</i></p>
<p>Assessment method</p>	<p><i>At the end of the lesson, students will fill-in the questionnaire prepared by the teacher about the Roman odeio. They will also reflect on the comparison between Roman era globalization and modern era globalization and will employ the method of critical thinking and critical reading. They will state what they liked or disliked and will suggest improvements for future activities on this topic.</i></p>
